How Do I Create a Balanced List?

Your list should be diverse in at least these three ways:

SELECTIVITY

It's important to have a variety of schools in your college list. Applying only to safety schools means you may not be exploring your full potential & applying only to highly selective schools leaves you without any backup options.

TYPE OF SCHOOL

There are a few different categories to consider when creating a balanced college list. While you should definitely focus specifically on what you look for in a college, make sure to keep your options open. Look for variety.

REGION

You may be certain that you want to stay close to home. You may be certain that you want to go out-of-state. In either case, it is important to apply to a couple of schools in a different region. Things may change during your senior year so once again, make sure to keep all your options open.

You are confident that you will be accepted because your test scores, grades, and activities fall above their 50th percentile/greatly exceed their average. (3-4)	These schools are a great match for you. Your test scores, grades, and activities fall at least within the 50th percentile. (3-5)	These schools are highly selective. 




Build your college list

Early Decision

Early decision plans are BINDING — a student who is accepted as an ED applicant must attend the college.

- Apply early (usually in November) to first-choice college.
- Receive an admission decision from the college well in advance of the usual notification date (usually by December).
- Agree to attend the college if accepted and offered a financial aid package that is considered adequate by the family.
- Apply to only one college early decision.
- Apply to other colleges under regular admission plans.
- Withdraw all other applications if accepted by ED.
- Send a nonrefundable deposit well in advance of May 1.

Early Action

Early action plans are NONBINDING — students receive an early response to their application but do not have to commit to the college until the normal reply date of May 1.

- Apply early.
- Receive an admission decision early in the admission cycle (usually in January or February).
- Consider acceptance offer; do not have to commit upon receipt.
- Apply to other colleges under regular admission plans.
- Give the college a decision no later than the May 1 national response date.

Benefits & Drawbacks of Early Admissions

Benefits:

- Reduced waiting time
- Saved time and expense of submitting multiple applications
- In some cases, there are slightly higher admission rates for ED applicants.
- Applications can be deferred & considered for RD.

Drawbacks:

- Additional pressure to decide early
- Inability to compare financial aid packages
- Time crunch for other applications
- Senioritis

Regular Decision

Most applicants apply through Regular Decision.

- Deadlines vary from institution to institution.
- There will be different deadlines for financial aid and other requirements.
- You are required to make your final college choice by May 1.



Fee waivers are provided by:

- the Common App if you qualify for free/reduced lunch
- College Board if you qualified for SAT fee waivers
- NACAC if you meet their economic need indicators
- Questbridge finalists receive fee waivers for their 36 partner colleges
- Certain schools provide school specific fee waivers
- Guidance Counselors
